VISION: Thunderwing residents have equal opportunity and their community is recognized as a safe neighborhood for all.

MISSION: We coordinate and mobilize existing resources across sectors, to give families the support they need so they can prevent and permanently stabilize crisis situations.

GOALS:

- Increase community safety
- Enhance the wellbeing of families living in the Thunderwing Community
- Improve the relationship between service providers and the coordination of services
- Improve the relationship between families and systems

On Dec 10, 2013, Elders Stella Blackbird and Audrey Bone held a naming ceremony at Urban Circle Training Centre.

The name that came from the spirits was Thunderwing, thunder representing rejuvenation and wing representing protection.

The Ojibwe name for Thunderwing is Animikii Aningwiigan and the Cree name is Khakitochuk Ohkun. The colours of Thunderwing are blue, red, white, and yellow.

We honour the name and colours of Thunderwing through a feast and tobacco offering each spring.

Referrals and Family Engagement

Any agency can refer an individual or family to Thunderwing. We have received 125 referrals since September 2014. Of these, 95 were accepted, and 81 files have been opened. Of these, at March 31, 2019, 53 were completed, representing an 83% success rate (as 17 were still active).

Participants receive coordinated resource and service support through their Thunderwing Support Team for up to a year. Upon completion, we host a wrap-up gathering and provide a Certificate of Collaboration.


- A family's readiness for support and change is an important part of the process



Thunderwing Hub

Community-based and government agencies are represented on the multi-sectoral Thunderwing Hub. Informed consent from participants is required before their situation is brought forward. Hub members gather 1 to 2 times each month to consider family situations, strengths and goals, for the purpose of gathering information and breaking down barriers to effective and efficient service delivery. The key roles of the Hub members are:

Mobilization

Working outside regular practice when regular practice isn't working

Collaboration

Working together to fit services to families' needs and meet their goals



Thunderwing is a member of the Manitoba Community Mobilization and Safety Initiatives Network, along with other projects in Selkirk, Stonewall, Dauphin, Steinbach, Gimli, Brandon, Altona, Thompson, Swan River, Winkler and Portage la Prairie; and EVA (Ending Violence Across) Manitoba. Block by Block provides staff time and funding support to the Network.

Thunderwing Support Teams

We bring together existing and new supports in a family's life to break down barriers and support them in reaching their goals. Since 2014, we have engaged 398 professionals from 98 agencies in 594 Support Team meetings:

- 33 Community Based Organizations such as North End Community Renewal Corporation, Andrews Street Family Centre
- 19 schools
- 14 Child and Family Services agencies
- 11 Manitoba Government programs such as EIA, Manitoba Housing, Probation Services, Victim Services, Children's Disability Services
- 8 Winnipeg Regional Health Authority programs such as Families First, Homecare, Public Health


- 5 others such as child care centres, Public Trustee, subsidized housing provider
- 3 Winnipeg Police Service units

Families are also encouraged to invite natural supports to join their Support Team.

The length of Thunderwing involvement is unique to each family; typically 6 to 7 Support Team meetings are held during their time with Thunderwing. The family-centred Thunderwing Collaboration Model guides the work of our Support Teams.

Thunderwing Outcomes

We use an extensive evaluation design to examine Thunderwing's impact. The tables below illustrate outcomes for children/youth and adult participants based on information gathered from Support Teams before a file is opened, and then again upon completion.

SOCIAL RETURN ON INVESTMENT

Social Return on Investment (SROI) measures and reports the social value of program impacts that are difficult to quantify, such as community well-being. In September 2017, a third-party SROI was completed for Thunderwing.

For every \$1 invested in Thunderwing, \$5 in social value was created.

The biggest system impacts were in the areas of child welfare, policing and justice.

Block by Block Community Safety and Wellbeing Initiative

Thunderwing is a project of the Block by Block Community Safety and Wellbeing Initiative. Block by Block is a platform for multi-sectoral collaboration on long-term, sustainable solutions to complex social issues.

We work to identify and address barriers that impact community safety and individual and family wellbeing.
